
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ELLAS

A new program at CAMPO celebrating women + creativity. Here, curator and moderator **Camila Pose** shares her impressions.

wonder how to inhabit the "space" in these times of complex circulation. I also wonder how we women have always inhabited artistic spaces: What is the difference that moves us to enunciate ourselves by our gender, in order to appeal to an integration in terms of rights and visibility?

I arrived at CAMPO Canteen in December 2020 to dream up a collaboration with Heidi. The main subject was clear from the start: women. The first ELLAS was launched on February 20, and months later its impact still resonates. The afternoon saw 400 people (with masks) interacting and giving life to the proposal in Canteen's garden, appropriating and inhabiting the space, each one from their sacred singularity as foci of light that form a resplendent network.

The conversations with the exhibiting artists allowed us to put between question marks the very name that summoned us — ELLAS? To what extent does that enunciation encourage

— as if we were lining up in a ghetto — the disintegration and the scenario of huge and systemic injustices and invisible and daily injustices, which we appeal to reconstruct and reinvent? The voice was raised by all. Feminist

artists, women activists for equality outside their work as artists, artists disaffected from their gender in front of the blank canvas.

An excerpt by Sara Ahmed from her book *Living a Feminist Life* haunts me for its accurate simplicity about the act of transmitting. She talks about theorizing from our own work and learning from what happens with what we bring. First, we throw something and then witness what happens to that which we have thrown, so as to develop and refine understanding: "We change our way of thinking and even what we think from the changes we fail to produce with our attempts."

We are on the way to exercise creative freedom as a right, denaturalizing the feminine and the masculine as watertight categories, proposing new languages and exchanges and pointing out points of tension in the face of cultural limits. It is time to retell history from us and out loud. It is time to make history from the exciting and prolific multiplicity.

I created for CAMPO Artfest 2019, CAMPO invited me to work with the kids of the pueblo once again for CAMPO Artfest 2020 Online. The idea was to produce a collective installation in the village from individual works made with recycled materials and paste in the kids' names as well as the names of individuals and families who donated to the crowdfunding campaign that supported this year's festival. It's always a great experience to work with the kids. And this year was no different. They were receptive and jumped right in, sharing found materials and painting together. It's a resource to open their minds, to see the world of contemporary artists, and especially what is possible. ■








Around Town:

Q+A with Rodrigo Diz, owner of Sierra Oriental



eet Rodrigo Diz, owner of Sierra Oriental Winery, just outside of Pueblo Garzón. With his wife Florencia, the Argentines landed in Uruguay in 1998, fell in love with the region, and put down roots in 2003. Here, we chat with Rodrigo about wine, art and more.

CAMPO: We are so excited to have you as a Co-Chair of CAMPO Council/Uruguay. What does it mean for you?

RODRIGO: I am excited and proud to be a part of CAMPO and mostly looking forward to all the amazing things CAMPO will bring, give and share to our community. It is a privilege to be in a place that thinks mid- and long-term about supporting and sharing with artists, expanding the community and helping the neighborhood to set a foothold in the Art Scene of the world. It will be a pleasure to grow our family, find new friends and people that think alike, and give to culture, art and community.

C: What is your relationship to art?

R: It is simply an admiration of those people that decide to dedicate a life to create, to give color, black and white, build, innovate... make us feel emotions when we see, listen or read. I have been on fundraising Committees for MALBA, worked with art consulting departments at banks. Florencia and I collect, but mostly, we like to learn from what is out there — to be seen, read or listened to.

C: We know there is a strong family tradition with the land. How was Sierra Oriental born?

R: I never knew how strong my family tradition with the Land was until Florencia made me read *The Good Earth* by Pearl Buck. Part of my family is from Spain and the other half from

Italy; land, wine, olive oil and landscapes are in my genes. When I saw the hills of Garzón and Maldonado from a José Ignacio beach at the age of 16, I always dreamt of having my own farm with horses, cattle, vines and olive orchards of working all day and then taking a trip to the beach. That was 1984. With Florencia, in 2003, the dream came true and the first chapter of our story started in the hills of Maldonado, west of Garzón and the José Ignacio River. The vineyards and orchards were planted in the spring of 2004 and Sierra Oriental's brand was born in 2011. The name represents the sierras (hills) we stand on and my wife's half-Japanese heritage, blended with the name of this fabulous country - República ORIENTAL del Uruguay - leads to the other half of our brand name. How much more descriptive can it get?

C: Do you see potential for the development of wine + culture in the region?

R: Oh my God, YES! Both go together, they blend. Wine and Art as stand-alones are great, but get them together and the sky's the limit. Wine in Uruguay is improving and more recognized by the day. The land structure is spectacular, and along with the proximity to the sea and the winds make this a privileged place to grow vines. Uruguay, the small and quiet country, is home to great artists in the modern and contemporary art scene, such as Torres García, a constructivist considered the father of Latin American Modern Art, authors like Mario Benedetti, Horacio Quiroga and Juana de Ibarbourou and music composers that give us the Murgas and the Carnavales. And today's Luciano Supervielle who is a pure creative soul and has united many generations with his ensemble Bajofando joining Tango to contemporary sounds and rhythms. Do I see potential? Yes, a definite and conclusive YES!
